Department of Ministry to Offer AB History and Polity Course

The ABCRM Department of Ministry will offer an American Baptist History and Polity Class on June 9-11 at the ABCRM office in Centennial, CO. There will be approximately 12 contact hours plus additional time spent learning healthy communication and spiritual practices. This class is a requirement for people seeking Region ordination and those who wish to have a non-ABC/USA ordination recognized. It is also open to others who are interested in the subject.

The instructor is Slayden Yarbrough, retired Professor Emeritus of Religion, Oklahoma Baptist University. Slayden also served as Executive Director of the Historical Commission (SBC), and Executive Director of the Southern Baptist Historical Society. Slayden is a prolific writer of both books and articles. He and his wife, Janis, live in downtown Denver, are members of First Baptist Church, and are avid baseball fans. He is a gifted lecturer and a well-rounded educator who brings his contagious energy and sense of humor with him into the classroom.

The primary text for the course will be the Judson Press book, *Down by*

the Riverside. In his book, author Everett Goodwin includes an overview of Baptist history in the United States as a guide to understanding Baptist faith and identity. By revealing the essential principles and distinctions of Baptist belief and by providing information on the theological and historical origins of those beliefs, this text becomes a valuable orientation tool for those who are new to Baptist thought. In addition to attending all scheduled sessions, reading assignments, and participating in class discussion, two written assignments will also be required.

The class will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, June 9 and end with lunch on Sunday, June 11. Housing will be provided at the Candlewood Suites, located just across the street from the ABCRM office. The class fee of \$200 includes two nights' lodging, two lunches, and one group dinner in addition to the class experience.

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Wyoming Cluster Churches Meet Together to Strengthen Camp WYOBA

On Saturday, April 1st, representatives from 10 Wyoming American Baptist churches met at First Baptist in Casper to discern ways to strengthen the ministry of Camp WYOBA.

Those who gathered at noon enjoyed a camp meal prepared by Jackie Brunner and her assistant, Jesse Martinez. Jackie and Jesse have been hired to prepare the meals at WYOBA. After everyone enjoyed the meal and table fellowship, Eric Moorhouse picked up his guitar to lead the group in singing some favorite camp songs.

A testimonial letter was read expressing how God had brought personal change to one individual's life at WYOBA. The atmosphere was just like "being there" at WYOBA, except there wasn't any campfire smoke.

During the rest of the time together, the ministries and needs of WYOBA were presented. Whalen Woodward reminded everyone of how churches and individuals had responded previously in raising money for the purchase of more land, the installation of the sewer system, the upgrading of the water supply, and countless other projects. He challenged the group to think about the following projects:

- New roof on the dining hall
- Completion of the fire circle
- Improvement of the entrance to WYOBA
- Timber clearing
- Improvement of roadways
- Renovation of nurse's cabin
- Other cabin upgrades
- Regular maintenance



The 2006 budget of \$64,700 was presented by Bill Mitchell. In order for this budget to be fulfilled, every American Baptist Church in Wyoming must be involved by sending children, youth, and adults to the various camping ministries along with making the funding of WYOBA a priority in each local church budget.

Eric Moorhouse has prepared an excellent CD to help promote the ministries of WYOBA in 2006. It is entitled *WYOBA Is Your Place*, and is a pictorial and musical presentation that highlight's God transforming work taking place at WYOBA. Tribal Theology and Tribal Resources

(This article is the fifth and final in a series written by Ahaio Vashum, our global mission partnership specialist. Ahaio will be returning to India in June. We appreciate his contribution to our understanding of his culture and ministry.)

Theological reflections based on tribal life experiences and traditional heritage are essential to formulating tribal theologies. The tribals are endowed with rich cultural and religious resources. In our search for an articulation of meaningful theology, we must retrieve the cultural values that are known to be life affirming and liberating. This search involves processes of recollection, remembering, and sharing with a view to formulating a theology that will ultimately be inclusive, dialogical, liberating, and above all, empowering. Following are pointers to how our rich traditional heritages might be rediscovered for the purpose of developing a relevant tribal theology.

Traditional Heritages

Myths and legends, folktales and stories, wisdom and proverbs, mores and morals, and songs are always orally transmitted from generation to generation. These sources make up the text of the unwritten guide for tribal living.

Tribal Religion/Tribal Worldview

Tribals are deeply religious people; they believe in the Supreme Being. Without any written scripture, they turn to myths and legends and the whole creation for instruction.

Myths

In many cultures, myths are sacred, exemplary, significant stories that

convey profound theological and religious meanings of a particular group of people. They tell us about God and God's relationships with human beings and all of creation.

Rites and Rituals

Rites and rituals affirm the inter-relatedness of humanity and creation and convey messages of wholeness and unity. Ceremonies are observed so that creation and humanity might co-exist in peace and harmony.

Socio-Cultural Traditions

These are cultural principles based on social, justice, and kinship relations. Communitarianism, the principle of selfless love and concern for the well being of the community, is a basic socio-cultural principle that influences tribal theology.

Conclusion

There is no single theology in the world that can claim to have universal relevance for all people and for all time. The act of doing theology is never the monopoly of a section of people in the world. Doing theology has always been the privilege of one and all.

In light of these assumptions, tribal theology seeks to find meaning and relevance in the faith expressions of the tribal people in the context of their socio-economic and political realities. The vision of tribal theology is to bring wholeness and healing in the lives of the people, both at personal and communal levels. This effort is necessary as we seek to develop a theology that embodies our cultural heritage and identity.

FBC of Loveland Engages in Chilean Mission with the Bolicks

When we began planning the Chile trip last year, there were many unknowns. At the time, we had no idea how many people would be traveling from Loveland, what their gifts would be, and what expectations would exist. As the plans came together, we found that the group size would be large, the talents would be many, and the expectations would be high. We went to minister with Dwight and Barbara Bolick, AB missionaries, in the fields of economics and leadership development.

The final product resulted in seven different presentations to the congregations in Temuco, Lautaro, and the Mapuche areas by twelve members of First Baptist. The presentations focused on the quality of life, classroom management, trauma, sermon preparation, dental education, Vacation Bible School, and conflict transformation. All of the programs were well received, and the congregations who hosted us were pleased with the outcome.

This mission trip was unique for several reasons, but the biggest reason was that during this experience, we were invited to stay in the homes of people in the areas we visited. This personal experience added profound depth to the entire mission. Witnessing first-hand the family and cultural dynamics was a blessing to all who participated. Imagine what life would be like if TV, radio, the internet, movie theaters, sports teams, cars, and the dozens of other distractions we take for granted didn't exist. The view of the world shifts.

We experienced an overwhelming sense of “bigness.” Although we all left things back home that we could have taken, it seemed as though we still had truckloads of “stuff” compared to the people in whose homes we stayed. More than once I heard the comment, “I have more stuff in my luggage than they have in their entire closet!”

In addition, team members were grateful recipients of the grace that was extended to us. Despite the language barrier, cultural differences, physical limitations, and other reasons of which we are probably unaware, the members of the churches welcomed us and our baggage with an open heart. As a result, we felt we were being served instead of serving.

We took with us 200 T-shirts, glue sticks, scissors, necklace kits, markers, crayons, and pounds of construction paper, not to mention well-researched presentations, translated poems, Power Point slides, gifts from our church and families to theirs. We took time from our lives and money from our accounts, and stepped into another culture where we hoped we would have a constructive influence on the churches we visited. I sincerely

hope the positive message they received from our presence has at least a fraction of the impact that the experience had on us.

A Little Church That Did!

This is a story of a little church that could—and did! Aurora Community Baptist Church, started in “old” Aurora in 1958 at 19th and Macon, has seen its best days. The best days of a full church, a membership of over 300, a Sunday school of over 400 brought to church by the bus loads, men’s groups, women’s groups, youth and Boy Scouts all made the church, the parsonage, and the Education Building ring with voices of praise and laughter, and expand with enthusiasm. Then “old” Aurora began to change. Other churches moved into the neighborhood, families moved out as the prosperity of the 50s and 60s came along, and new families moved in. Suddenly, “old” Aurora became a transient community. More change came during the next few decades. The community became about 60% Hispanic, and the church membership dwindled down in numbers and moved up in age. They had to work hard just to keep things going!

It was toward the end of their previous pastor, Le Fox’s, tenure that he and a few church leaders realized that they needed to do something that could keep the church going and leave a legacy in that community. Le retired at the end of May, 2005. Subsequently, the Search Committee met with Transitional Executive Minister, Desmond Hoffmeister, to begin the process of searching for a new pastor. When they suggested that they ought to look for an Hispanic pastor, Desmond leaped at the chance and said he would get someone to work with their committee who could assist in this process. That’s where I came into the picture. During that process I eventually became their

Interim Pastor for three months and during that time helped the church look at themselves, their future, their neighborhood, and the decisions that they might have to make.



We learned of the New Church Planting program sponsored by National Ministries and discovered that they might be able to help fund a new Hispanic church at the existing Aurora site. Pablo Calzoncit, director of Hispanic Ministries for National Ministries, came to Aurora, met with members of the Search Committee, was excited about the possibilities, and promised his help. Then, the church, at its quarterly business meeting in July 2005 voted to call a full-time Hispanic pastor to start a new church plant, to be funded by National Ministries, ABCRM, other churches in the Region, and their church. They also voted to fund a part-time interim pastor who would continue with the present congregation.

Summer became fall, and my promised time as interim pastor came to an end, but not my commitment to continue with them on this life-changing process. Bruce Greer (now Transitional Pastor at Calvary Baptist Church/Denver) began his ministry in September and kept the church focused on their goal. When Bruce was called to Calvary, the church looked for another interim pastor, and found Anne Dondapati Allen who was a missionary-in-residence at Calvary and doctoral candidate at Iliff School of Theology in Denver. Shortly after she started, the Search Committee received

word from Pablo Calzoncit that he had found the ideal pastoral candidate for the new church.

Oscar Lopez and his wife Vianaye Lopez (*pictured below*) visited with the Search Committee in March. The committee unanimously called Oscar to be pastor. He began his ministry on April 3rd and will soon launch a radio ministry.



So the little church that thought that their best days were behind them found that they could give themselves to a new ministry. They found that this little church could do something meaningful for the Kingdom and leave a legacy. They found that they could take a risk—a leap of faith—to help others of a different culture in their search for Christ. They found they could minister with people whose spirits needed to be infused with God’s spirit!

Please pray for this new church—*International Palabra de Fe*—and the Lopezes. Discover how you can help this church that came from the church that was small, but thought big!

Khristos Voskres! Voistinu Voskres! He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!

On Easter Day, these words will be spoken all over Russia, in many places for the very first time! Easter is the greatest religious holiday, even greater than Christmas, in most countries of Eastern Europe. During the years of communist domination, like all religious holidays, Easter was removed from the calendar.

Russian Easter starts on Saturday night. The faithful arrive at church in the late evening bringing their traditional Easter dessert (*paskha*) and Easter sweet bread (*kulich*) and some Easter eggs to be blessed. Church attendance at this ceremony is at its highest (since Easter is the most important Orthodox holiday) leaving many people outside the church, candle in hand. Near midnight the priest leads a procession of deacons, altar boys, the choir, and parishioners. This procession is called a *krestnyi khod*, which in this case symbolizes the search for Jesus' body by Mary Magdalene and others, and the subsequent discovery that Christ is risen. The procession circles around the outside of the church three times, its members singing as they go. The main church doors represent the sepulchre, and when they are opened the priest announces several times that Christ is risen: "*Khristos voskres!*" The congregation each time answers, "*Voistinu voskres!*" ("He is risen indeed!")

Directly after this ceremony and for several days thereafter, a ritual takes place, usually between friends

(though complete strangers also participate): one person goes to another and says “*Khristos voskres!*” The other must answer; “*Voistinu voskres!*” and then they kiss three times on alternate cheeks. Directly after church that night, the Lenten fast is broken; the first meal with eggs, butter, and meat is eaten. This can include *paskha* and *kulich*.

As I think about these Easter customs and traditions in Russia, my heart is burdened for the people there who do not know the real meaning of Easter. Thank you for joining us on the front lines to fight with your prayers for millions of lives whose eternity is at stake. Please pray for our ministry as we prepare for our Summer of Hope outreach. As you know, I feel a strong burden to reach children of Russia with the message of Risen Savior. I am so excited about what the future holds, and I am deeply grateful to all who help us communicate the message of the Risen Savior.
