Church and Community

Matthew 18:5 *Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me.*

In a private religious middle school not far from my home the boys are jolly kids with an inclusive attitude; the girls are NOT. They are in cliques based on what they judge to be the cool attire and other important things they decide one must have or do to fit into their crowd.

We often think petty or mean behavior is in other places, but Columbine taught us we all need to check our values and example setting.

Two years ago I started promoting the Hands and Words Are Not For Hurting Project. Have you taught it, promoted it, prayed about using it? At our splendid Winter retreat we considered briefly the harm done to those caught in the trap of sex trafficking, and we were asked to pray about it.

I want to add to that, to pray that children around the world will have a chance for a good education that will prepare them for a job and will enable them to take care of their family. Thus they will not have to search for gain far from home, unless it is a clear opportunity.

A good educational system includes friendly schools; the Hands Project can help. The steps you can take in your community are:

1. Contact a teacher, counselor, principal in a local school or your alma mater and explain the purpose of the project: To help pupils gain respect for others and know their responsibilities in their community.

2. Give examples of the decline in poor behavior in schools that have adopted the pledge and that have the pupils recite it daily.

3. A big plus is that test scores often go up when students feel safe.

4. Take the Hands and Words brochure to give to those you contact.

5. Try to answer the questions the people may have or refer them to the Hands and Words website (www.handsproject.org) or the email: (info@handsproject.org) or phone (888-443-6299).

6. Anyone is welcome to contact me also. My phone is not as busy as the above. I have several handouts to share. (My number is 303-455-4792).

With the help of others in your church you can reach out to many more. PLEASE remember when going out into the community that this is a nonsectarian project. It is strictly your gift of an idea for others to learn the Hands and Words Pledge for their own benefit and those to whom they teach the 14 word pledge.

THE PLEDGE: I WILL NOT USE MY HANDS OR MY WORDS TO HURT MYSELF OR OTHERS.

The founder Ann Kelly is a black belt; she believes in defense: protecting yourself and others from all kinds of abuse. She has worked tirelessly for ten years to promote this concept.

The Gift of Fear by Gavin De Becker

Winter Retreat 2007

As the snow fell on Colorado, the women of the state began to gather at the Franciscan Retreat Center in Colorado Springs. The weekend was to be a time to relax and reconnect with Christ.

Friday night session began with ice breakers. The women mingled around the room discovering fun facts about the women they were spending the weekend with. Running late because of the weather, Virginia Holmstrom (right) arrived and began her teaching with introducing the group to lectio divina. It is a practice of scripture reading and meditation. She encouraged the women to use this practice in their devotional times throughout the weekend and to carry it back to "real" life.



Saturday morning was cold, but the conference room was warm. The morning session started with singing lead by Martha Lee Lowe and her soon to be daughter-in-law, Louellen Hurst. Virginia Holmstrom spoke about the old testament, and inclusion or exclusion of Gentiles. She also spoke about the "Break the Chains" program the ABWM is sponsoring in 2007 through 2009.

The afternoon was free time for everyone. Many of the women spent time in fellowship with others. Some ventured out into the cold to walk the labyrinth the Center has. Others took long walks around the property, and others left to venture out into Colorado Springs. Still others just stayed at the Retreat Center and took a well deserved nap or rest.

At 5:00 p.m. the group came together again to watch and discuss the movie "Fields of Mudan." This short movie (only about twenty minutes) centers on a young girl who was forced into the sex trade. It is a very powerful video that emphasizes the need to be aware of what is going on in the world, and around

the corner from your house. This movie was produced by Florida State University in 2005 (www.fieldsofmudan.com).

After dinner, provided by the retreat center, there was more singing. A discussion of creation, a new way of looking at it, and how it can relate to our lives today, was conducted by Virginia. The evening then wrapped up with the annual talent show. The show consisted of a piano piece, a poem recitation, jokes read, dances done, stories told, many songs sung, and even a cow horn was played. The "Five Star Generals" (also known as the current and four past ABWM Colorado presidents) had the women rolling in laughter as they sang a rendition of "My Favorite Things."



Sunday morning the women came together for one last gathering in a service of worship. Virginia Holmstrom delivered the message and Rev. Kathy Bird-DeYoung and Rev. Jo Murrow lead communion. Songs were sung, prayers were said, and the women were sent on their way back to "reality" rested and renewed in Christ.

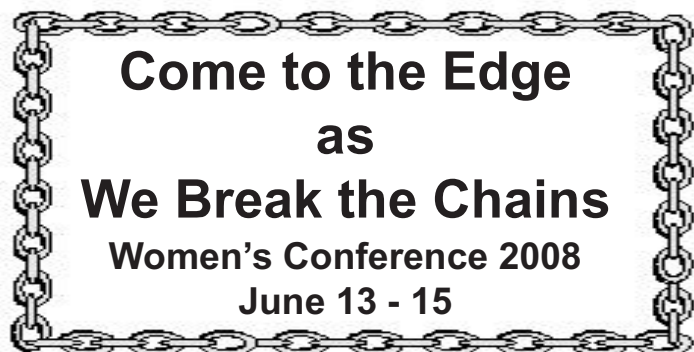
We do need to keep reminding all our members of the importance of giving to Love Gift, the "over and above" fund for our denomination.

White Cross

By the time you receive this most of the work for White Cross should be completed. I know you are all happy to have accomplished so much this year for White Cross. I am in charge of White Cross for First Baptist, Boulder, and we received help from our Missions Ministry Team which allowed us to complete our request fully. Two of us spent from 11:30 a.m. till almost 6:00 p.m. one day in early January shopping for White Cross. We were two very tired ladies at the end of the day! Be sure you include your entire church in your White Cross projects, either in items or money so that you can buy your items. It certainly helped us! And don't forget to get Association Reports to me as soon as you are able. I have already received one, thanks Eastern! I had some input at the national level this fall to help clarify some of the forms we get. I hope the new forms will be easier to work with.

The White Cross Project for the State Conference will be gifts for residents at Franklin Park, an American Baptist low-income facility in Denver. The request for the Health Center is for "footie" socks (which are low slung socks with a non-slip tread on the bottom). The request for the Independent Living residents is towel sets (bath, hand, and washcloth). Target or Walmart variety are fine. There are 90 in the Health Center and 91 in the Independent Living building and they would really like to have something for each resident. So our goal is 100 "footies" and 100 towel sets. The extras would be used for new residents when they enter the facility. Let's see how many we can bring to the State Conference and really shower them with these items!

Mission and Service Ministries

Just a little reminder about our State Project for 2007-2008. Our goal of \$2,000.00 is open for donations until June 12, 2008.

“Break the Chains: Slavery in the 21st Century”

Did you know? Slavery exists even today. Nearly one million persons are trafficked across international borders every year. Twenty thousand of these victims are trafficked into the United States. The majority are women and girls.

Trafficking is the fastest growing of the three top criminal industries in the world today: Trafficking includes the selling of women and children for sex. We want to help ministries make a difference both in the U.S. and around the world. The donations raised will be used nationally and internationally. Funds will nurture and strengthen ministries that help break the chains of sex trafficking in the United States and in other countries...in the name of Jesus.

When you give to “Break the Chains” during the project's first year, you will help fund new ministries in Thailand through the New Life Center Foundation directed by ABC missionary Karen Smith. “Break the Chains” will enable the New Life Center in Chiang Mai to educate 50 girls and women who have never had the chance to receive education because they've been exploited in work or labor. In addition, “Break the Chains” funds will help the New Life Center provide rehabilitation services to 15 girls and women who are victims of sexual abuse, labor exploitation, and human trafficking.

First year funding from “Break the Chains” will also launch a new ministry in Costa Rica. American Baptist missionary Mylinda Baits tells us that Costa Rica is both a transit and destination point for trafficked children. A ministry in the Philippines will also benefit from the first year funds raised from “Break the Chains”.

Together we can comfort those who mourn, and “bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair.”

E-Mail from Thailand

From Karen Van, who is on the first of four Region sponsored mission trips, to the Region office:

Dear Friends,

What an amazing experience. After two days of travel (Wednesday and Thursday), we arrived at our hotel in Bangkok at 2 am on Friday. To help fight the jet lag, we had a full day on Friday. Annie Dieselberg, an American Baptist missionary, met us at the hotel on Friday morning and took us to the morning worship service at Night Light Ministry. Annie is the CEO of Night Light, which was organized in 2005 to help women and children escape Thailand's large sex trade. This ministry started by taking in one woman and is currently assisting 78 women by giving them employment making beautiful jewelry. Not only do they have employment, but after 3 months are entitled to a health plan, savings program with a 5 % company match, English classes and "Jesus 101". Jeff Dieselberg, Annie's husband and fellow AB missionary, showed us around Night Light and shared successes and challenges of their ministry. They are combining running a jewelry business to give the women a legitimate job and also providing them a place to learn about Jesus. We were impressed by Jeff and Annie Dieselberg, the wonderful staff of employees and volunteers, plus the women of True Light (some amazing stories!!). After a full day at the Center, we met Annie and about 6 other women for dinner. This group gathers on Tuesday and Friday nights to go to the bars/sex clubs to talk to other women. They listen to their stories and let them know that there are people who care. Through this outreach, over 100 women have come to Night Light and 25 have been baptized. Truly God's work on earth. On Saturday, we left the huge city of Bangkok and flew to Chaing Rai (northern Thailand). While in Chaing Rai, Chuck and Ruth Fox are our hosts. They have been in Thailand for 8 years and work with people of the Akha villages. This morning we attended Sunday worship services at an Akha village and

enjoyed seeing the installation of their new pastor. What an impact American Baptists have had over the years in so many parts of Thailand. So many schools, hospitals, clean water projects, and many other life changing projects have been completed by American Baptists or American Baptist funds. The missionaries have worked with the local people on these improvements and it is amazing to see the extent of the ministry. The pastor who was installed today was the brother of a man who was installed as a pastor by a missionary in Burma years ago. It is hard to put into words the amazing things we are seeing. These are just quick thoughts and it will take awhile to process the many experiences we are having.

A second short e-mail

I woke up early today...my mind needs time to process everything we are seeing. So many times during the day yesterday I was reminded that one person can make a difference. Our day on Monday was a busy day of learning about different ministries here. We saw the morning assembly at a school for 2,200+ hill tribe children, listened to the head of the AKHA Foundation, toured the Mangkong Foundation's new facility headed by Scott Coates and spent the evening with Chuck and Ruth Fox. Each story spoke to faith at work in the world. References overlapped during the day about earlier missionaries in Burma and Thailand. One statement I heard yesterday that was encouraging was even though the number of Christians is not large (but it is growing), the Christians are respected for their integrity. Christians running for office have a good chance of winning because of their honesty (many Thai officials are corrupt). Living their faith, daily acts of kindness towards all people, looking beyond today and taking on the big issues have resulted in a better life for many people in Thailand. Thanks for the prayers. Hello Everyone,

This is to let you know I am now in Nicaragua. It has been a very good experience so far. The people are different from Costa Rica. Much poorer.

We have been to several places in which I think the women are going to enjoy. People are very friendly and nice.

David and Laura Parajon are good. I've seen them several times and will be eating dinner with them tonight at their home.

I have been at the Baptist Hospital and saw a doctor. I am having lots of pain in my side. I was given a shot and some meds. It has lessen a little, but not much. I am still on our busy schedule and have not slowed down.

Went to the live volcano this morning, which was neat. Going to the elder hostel this afternoon. I did not go to Bluefields where our missionaries Vital and Ketly are. The Parajons (missionary Doctors) thought it would be too much for me so we have done some other visits.

Life in Nicaragua is very hard. Lots of street vendors that are trying to make at least \$2.00 a day for their families.

What an experience that God is allowing me to have. I am truly blessed.

I do believe this will be a great trip for those who want to come. Costa Rica was also a blessing. Well better close. Off to another meeting.

Hope all of you are taking care. I will be going back to the hospital for a follow-up visit. Appreciate your continued prayer support.
