## Church and Community

"Serve GOD, SAVE The Planet"

As Christians we have the joy and responsibility of continual study, learning and teaching others, including AB Girls. What shall we teach? The ABCs: Our appreciation and knowledge of our real heroes - ABC Missionaries and heroes and peacemakers like Susan B. Anthony and Jane Addams.

Our B group to teach includes - Knowing the Beatitudes, real brotherhood and sisterhood and the reality of bullies.

Lastly though always before us, the C group is Care and Compassion for the children of God and His planet. The *Today Show* gave some clues this year on bullies and I placed them in the CBC newsletter: All Children need to learn how to fend off bullies. The family can help! These ideas were illustrated on a recent airing of the Today Show.

1. Show the child how to act; adults need to model assertiveness. (Assert means declare, state clearly, insist on one's rights).
2. Most important: Teach eye contact. A child should always look to see what colors other's eyes are.
3. Adults must acknowledge the child when he/she shows respectful assertiveness.
4. Let your children see you as a strong confident person routinely.
5. Take time to role play with your children. This requires practice, over and over.
6. When should you teach those things? By the time the child is in fifth grade.

*P.S.: The smartest move is to have a cool defense!*

We can see that keeping the peace by being cool and planning ahead takes time and courage. The Hands and Words Are Not For Hurting Project is an ongoing program if we want a world of peace and non-violence.

I quote now from the Rev. Dr. Gerald L. Durley of Atlanta in the Friends of the Earth News magazine as he addresses global warming:

'The faith community consistently prides itself on being in the prevention and healing business. Therefore, if we are serious about what we teach and preach, our message must speak clearly and bold to:

1. Reduce levels of energy consumption, and,
2. Shift to lean energy sources like wind and solar.
3. Learn how to effectively join forces with those who are more knowledgeable about improving environmental conditions; and,
4. Discuss in sermons, seminars, workshops, and lectures about health issues, weather conditions, economic concerns, and the negative impact of global warming which are all connected to how the environment is regarded.

There is so much that *can* and *must* be accomplished when we know what is happening to our environment and its direct impact on each of our lives. No one person, group, or organization can bring about complete *awareness* and comprehensive *change* alone. The faith community must become a far reaching, consistent voice, from pulpits, to exhort the masses to understand, get involved, speak out, and be converted to "SAVE OUR WORLD... FROM US!!!"

WE URGE ALL OF YOU TO COME TO GRAND JUNCTION IN JUNE and attend the Workshop from the Church and Community group. We will present new ideas on the Hands and Words project and how you can serve in your home and community to help save God's Planet.

I imagine most of your churches are either finished or nearly so and for that I thank you. We in Boulder completed our request before Christmas for the first time and it was a great feeling. Be sure your churches complete their reports for your Association chairs so that they can in turn complete theirs to send to me.

I know the economy has probably made the requests a little difficult for some of you. But if it is difficult for us, imagine what it must be like for those we try to help. Both the people at Anadarko and our Overseas recipients have much struggling to do and every little bit we can help them is greatly appreciated. Let's all pray that the economy improves both for us and for the people we are trying to help.

If any of you participate in New Garments Always keep in mind that you can no longer designate items for Curtis Park. However, our own Franklin Park Health Center is on the list, so here is a great opportunity for some extra help for them.

The White Cross Project for the Conference in June will be items for the Latimer House, which is an abused women's shelter in Grand Junction. They need the following items:

- Twin sized linens as well as pillows (new)
- Journals (to be used in their program)
- Diapers – toddler sizes
- Bath towels and washcloths
- \$10 gift certificates (Walmart, Target, Penney, etc.)

This sounds like a very worthwhile project. I hope we can have the wonderful response we had last year! I was very impressed and pleased. Thanks for all you do. Only God and those who receive the items we send know how much they mean.

## An Opportunity

Many of our churches support Church World Service as well as White Cross. Their purposes are very similar – to help others less fortunate than we are and especially to help during times of disaster and crisis. An opportunity has been provided to do just that during the ABC Biennial in Pasadena, California in June of this year. Those attending will attempt to put together 1,500 Church World Service kits – 500 each of health kits, hygiene kits, and baby layettes. We are very familiar with these kits as they are options for us every year on our White Cross requests. Here is how you can help, even if you are not going to the Biennial because they will need help from women all over the country to accomplish this task:

1. Send a personal contribution for supplies for the Church World Service kits. Make your check payable to ABCUSA, and mail it to ABCUSA, Office of Travel and Conference Planning, P.O. Box 851, Valley Forge, PA 19482-0851.
2. Organize a fund raising project in your church or organization to help raise \$50,000 for the kits.
3. Come to the Mission Fair at the Biennial in Pasadena in June and get involved! Assemble Church World Service kits and build play houses for children through Habitat for Humanity.

This is a huge undertaking, but with each of us doing a small part, it can be done! What a great way to celebrate 90 years of White Cross!

## A Visit to Anadarko Christian Center

As the weeks led up to Christmas I was blessed beyond measure by the way First Baptist in Sterling responded to the call for items needed at the Anadarko Christian Center in Anadarko, Oklahoma. And I was even more surprised when we picked up the finished collection from the church foyer. The box we use for American Baptist Women's Ministries is not a large box but this one was so full of items that my husband could not even lift the box!

The next several days after bringing all the gifts home, I sorted by type and tried to distribute the weight evenly. When all was said and done, we packaged the donations very effectively in two very large boxes and one smaller one.

I had spoken with Ben Sullivan, the director of the Anadarko Christian Center and arranged a date for delivery. With some much needed answer to pray I was able to get off work a day earlier than planned. I called and left a message on his voice mail - which he did not check! So we arrived in Anadarko, Oklahoma a day early and I called Ben Sullivan. He said he hadn't checked his messages

but he had a volunteer coming shortly and if he did not show up, he would come to town to meet us. I told him if the volunteer arrived it would not be necessary for him to make the trip.

Now we had been there awhile already but were tired from driving all night. We stopped and took photos of the town, and especially of a beautiful old mural on the main street. How can I describe Anadarko? It is a town which is obviously home to American Indians. We saw a park where a large Indian festival is held each year. It's also a very poor town and I couldn't fathom that there was not one house that didn't need some sort of paint job or repair.

While we were waiting in the parking lot of the Christian Center, a man rides up on a bicycle. He's wearing a coat and not one but three caps. As he enters the building we see him start to remove all his warm attire. He then comes back out with a broom and dustpan to clean up some trash littering the sidewalk. He spies us in the parking lot and we

strike up a conversation. Ramón was his name. He gave us a tour of the gym behind the soup kitchen. The gym also serves another purpose. It is a drop off point for donations and a place where people in need can come to get clothing, furniture and just about anything a person might need for their household. And by the way, the boxes we took were so heavy my husband and Ramón had to use a dolly to get them to the building! I was also blessed by my dentist who is new to Sterling. He gave me a box with hundreds of toothbrushes for the Indians.

Ramón's sweet spirit was a God-send to me. He spoke of how he had been off drugs for eight years but could not hold down a job due to seizures. He

told of us his wife and how he volunteers at the soup kitchen. He'd clean he said and do just about anything but cook! The soup kitchen serves daily and has had up to 150 people in one day. Ramón says when they need volunteers they just put out a call and pointing upward, he says, "The Lord brings them in."

I think I saw Ramón point upward at least seven times during our visit. After visiting

Anadarko I knew why the American Baptist Women had chosen this mission. It is truly a place where people need help. I don't know that I've ever seen a place quite like it in the United States. But that's not the end of the story, God always puts connections into our hearts. My oldest son became engaged on Christmas Eve last year. And on Christmas Day, I began talking to his fiancé about areas of Oklahoma where she has relatives. I mentioned we dropped off mission items in Oklahoma in December. She began to name towns and then said, "My great grandmother lived at Anadarko." I could have been surprised if I didn't know how the Lord works. He's a God of connections and surprises. She also reinforced what we had witnessed first-hand: that it is, indeed, a poor place.

And so the God of connections gave me two ways to always remember that we need to reach out to those less fortunate.

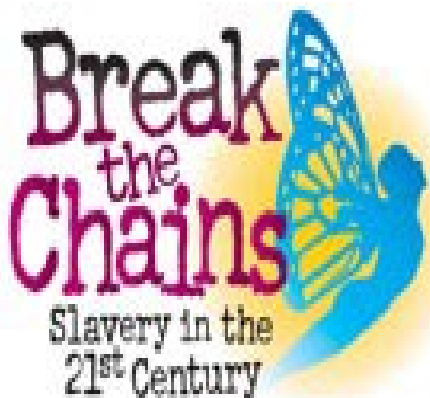

## Personal Development

### Who Is My Neighbor?

25 One day an expert in religious law stood up to test Jesus by asking him this question: "Teacher, what should I do to inherit eternal life?"

26 Jesus replied, "What does the law of Moses say? How do you read it?"

27 The man answered, "'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength, and all your mind.' And, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"

28 "Right!" Jesus told him. "Do this and you will live!"

29 The man wanted to justify his actions, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

Luke 10:25-29

The expert in religious law asked Jesus this question "And who is my neighbor?" in order to avoid following the command. In other words, he wanted an easy way out.

Jesus, however, defined the word *neighbor* by telling the story of the Good Samaritan. While we are probably all familiar with the story, here's an abbreviated version:

*A man was traveling on a very dangerous road and some thieves beat him up, stole his clothes and left him for dead on the side of the road. A priest and a Levite (temple assistant) both passed by him on the other side. Then a despised Samaritan stopped along the road and gave the man all the assistance he needed; including taking him to an inn and providing payment for all his bills.*

**In light of Jesus' teaching, consider what Proverbs 3 says about neighbors:**

28 *If you can help your neighbor now, don't say, "Come back tomorrow, and then I'll help you."*

29 *Don't plot harm against your neighbor, for those who live nearby trust you.*

30 *Don't pick a fight without reason, when no one has done you harm.*

Consistent with Jesus' teachings, the author of Proverbs encourages us to help our neighbors

and not bring harm to them. One easy way to begin to do this is simply to pray for one another.

The following story came from a Secret Place a few years ago. It is a true story written by Marjorie Carey from Florida. It shows that we all can help our neighbors and receive help from our neighbors...

*"Every day Miss Ruby, a resident in a nursing home, demanded to be wheeled to the dining room. She was always in a hurry, even though she would always be the first person there. She would then sit quietly, facing the door, waiting as others filled the large room.*

*When asked why she rushed to get to the dining room so early, she had a surprising answer. 'I'm ninety years old, and I don't get around so well anymore. I come first so I can say a prayer for each person as they come through the door.'*

*She could so easily have focused on her own aches and fragilities, but instead she seized the moment to pray for others. How easy it is for us to miss opportunities that come our way as we rush through our days!*

*'Pray for one another,' says the Scripture. Let us pray for God's blessing on those we meet today.'*

**Who is my neighbor?** This is still a valid question for us today. For some of us, our neighbors are limited to our friends. Sometimes, our neighbors are those who are similar to us, either in political views, church affiliation or even abilities. According to Jesus, our neighbor is anyone we can help – no matter what we may have in common with them.

This is what we value about being involved in ABWM. We enjoy being a part of a vibrant, strong, faith filled group of women who seek to reach out to our neighbors – near and far.

Of course, Ministry and Mission Coaches are available to assist with pastoral placement, other leadership issues, conflict transformation, and upon request, to provide a staff presence at local church celebrations.
