Seeing the Incarnation in Preaching....



As I have had the opportunity to travel, one of the traditions I have developed is looking for a crèche... a nativity scene... that is depicted in terms of the local culture. One of the first was a crèche from Alaska that depicted the manger as an igloo, the attendant animals as polar bears and Mary and Joseph as Aleuts. It is really cute- although it could have been better if the Wise Men from

the east had been Canadians.

Originally, I bought them because my wife enjoys them and I thought they were kind of cute and unique. Over time, however, they have taken on more meaning. They have become a depiction of the Holy Spirit incarnating the Christmas story into the various cultures around the world.

Bible while I preached. People no longer are subject to learning from just one source, one preacher who stands two-foot above contradiction in a sacred pulpit... they have literally thousands of voices from which to choose.

And yet this is exactly why preaching and teaching in the local church is so important: to help people in a particular time and place to understand God's love for us.



You see, The Word became flesh and dwelt among us for precisely this reason... to express, to show and to manifest God's love in the many and varied contexts in which we find ourselves. To the blind He offered sight, the deaf – hearing, the lame- healing, the poor- provision, the lonely- presence, the grieving – comfort, the hungry – food. His meta message – God loves you and I am here to unite you with My Father- was always the same- but the vehicle changed according to the context – the needs and abilities of the people to hear and understand the message. And the role of the preacher/teacher is to take the meta messages of the Gospel and translate them into the context of the people they are called to serve.

And so, just as Jesus proclaimed the message of His Father's love differently at Bethsaida where he encountered Peter and Philip versus the Gerasenes where he encountered the demoniac, on the mount where thousands came to hear his words versus in the temple where the scholars argued every little point of the law, with Mary and Martha who needed comfort and the raising of their brother from the dead versus those he called to follow Him and let the dead bury the dead; so too must we learn to speak the message of the gospel in the context of our ministry! The meta message never changing – God loves you and wants to be in relationship with youbut the pedagogy and methodology ever evolving as our people's needs, interests and ability to hear

continues to evolve.

Like the artist's rendition of the manger scene, we must craft the message of the Incarnation so that the ears we serve can hear the message of God's love and come to know the fullness of that love in their own hearts... and not just leave it to some expert at the other end of a computer connection.

May your preaching and teaching this holiday season be truly inspired (God breathed) and God's message of love conveyed where you are.

Creating Your Own Resource

As Jesus walked the highways and byways of Galilee, Samaria, and Judea, he encountered real people with real problems. He did not wake up and say, "I need to find a tax collector today." As we go through our day, we encounter many people who are in bondage and need to be set free (Luke 4:18-19). Sometimes, God places a special passion for responding to a problem in a church. We know that there are seeming unlimited number of problems that churches could address, but sometimes God places a special burden and passion on a church.

Too often, this passion gets lost between the dreaming stage and the doing stage. Perhaps they start by focusing on the size of the problem or the cost of addressing the problem. Perhaps they are daunted by insecurities, "Who are we to address this problem? We don't have the answers." Or they look at the congregation and they simply don't have the volunteers. In spite of all these "what ifs", God might still be calling your church to respond to a community need. God might want to use you to be the Jesus' incarnate presence in your community. Where do you start?

Step One: Identify the Problem that Needs to be Addressed

If you are not addressing a need for either the church or the community, why would you invest the time and energy to develop a resource. At this stage, it is important to ask really hard questions. A simple exercise to dig deeper into the problem is the <u>5 Whys</u>. The purpose is to get at root problems rather than presenting problems. When you identify your problem ask "why." Each time, you ask "why" of the answer until you unearth the root problem. Through this process, you often identify people who have a passion for this topic. Recruit them to the planning or working teams.

Second, you need to ask if others are already addressing this problem. If they are, then join with their efforts and bring Christ's witness even to secular organizations. The church rarely needs to duplicate services, but the church can join with others in doing good.

Recently, <u>Emmanuel Missionary Baptist Church</u> (Rev. Cleveland Thompson) took on just such a challenge. The presenting problem, too many young African

American young men end up in prison. They began exploring the causes and triggers for this problem. They wanted to get beyond the political rhetoric and blaming game. The result, they created a community workshop entitled, *The School to Prison Pipeline*. More will be said about this workshop later.

Step Two: Identify Potential Partners

Too often the church wants to do things alone. What if the church intentionally sought out partners with whom they could work to address significant problems? What agencies touch on this topic? Who else? Who else? Out of this process of connecting with partners, the vision and focus of the resource you are creating comes into sharper focus. These partners will add clarity and resources to the workshop/resource. It is also important for the church to be flexible as the project grows and matures.

Emmanuel began asking who might address this issue. Within the congregation, they had School Resource Officers, a school social worker, and a student who had just done a project on human trafficking. These were good resources, but they were not enough. They invited a District Judge from El Paso County, a Child Protection Social Worker, and the Superintendent from a neighboring school district. The judge not only gave

up six hours on a Saturday to participate, he "court ordered" a public defender and a prosecutor to also speak to this issue from their specific perspectives. The Child Protection Social Worker brought another social worker who helped speak to the issue. A Colorado Senator, heard about the workshop and spoke to the issue from his perspective on the Judicial Committee (no he was not "invited," but the committee agreed to give him time).

Step Three: Figure Out the Funding

Too often, the church limits their mission by considering budget first. There are a number of organizations who are willing to partner with churches (including ABCRM) if the purpose is truly community service. Perhaps some of the "partners" you identified above will help share the cost. Businesses might be willing to come along side and provide donations. If you are working far enough ahead, you might even be able to apply for grants.

Step Four: Work Out the Details

The details include the location, agenda, registration cost, length of the event, etc. Is it best to hold it at the church or another location? Do you charge for the event? Sometimes, if you don't charge, there is a perception that there is little value. How much time are you asking for from participants and speakers? Do you need to include refreshments and/or meals? What resources do you have (financial, human, etc.)? Who will emcee the event? Do you need greeters and support staff?

Step Five: Do the Hard Work of Promoting the Event

Sometimes we are guilty of thinking that if we have a good idea, it will promote itself. Rarely is this true. It is not enough to post your event on Facebook and on your website. Who are the key influencers who might promote your event? How do you generate buzz within the church and outside? This is not the fun part of creating a new resource, but if you are not going to attract people, why are you putting all the energy into creating it in the first place.

Sometimes we think that only big churches can pull off a community resource like this. It does take hours of planning. The pastor cannot pull it off on their own. I worked with a small, rural church in a community where people often returned "home" after retiring from a job in some other part of the country. This church put together a resource for empowering families dealing with multigenerational issues: a local doctor spoke about recognizing signs of dementia and Alzheimer's, a pharmacist spoke on the importance of tracking all medications, a lawyer addressed wills and power of attorney, a nurse taught basic skills such as testing blood sugar and taking blood pressure, a social worker provided guidelines to know when homecare was no longer appropriate, and a funeral director spoke to the importance of preparing before death.

What is the need that you can address in your community? What is your next step?

Bethel Baptist Church, Casper WY

Bethel Baptist Church in Casper, WY, was founded in 1954 as a daughter church of the Casper First Baptist Church. It is the most recently founded new ABC church in Wyoming, although the Wind River Indian Baptist Church has more re-



cently become part of ABC. Jim Bailey was a moving spirit in the founding. His son and daughter-in-law, Walt and Connie Bailey, are still active members of Bethel.

The current pastor is Rev. Dr. Steve Gunderson. Steve was originally baptized at Bethel and was married there. He and his wife Sharon spent considerable time in ministry in England, where Steve received his Ph.D. degree. The congregation has been energized by his ministry and especially appreciates the meaningful interpretation he gives to scripture in his sermons and Bible studies.

The modern sanctuary, dedicated in late 1966, is attractive with a wall of natural stone behind the baptistry, highlighted by a large cross. The building has been maintained and improved over the years, most recently by replacement of the exterior siding on the west side. There was extensive redecoration

a few years ago after a minor fire caused by a candle in an advent wreath caused smoke damage. The building is accessible, being built all on a single level.

The church and its pastor are involved

in the community. It is one of several churches and a Jewish synagogue which had an ecumenical community Thanksgiving service, followed by a community meal. The congregation works with Seton House, which serves single parents. Several of the Seton House children have been sent by Bethel to camp at Camp Wyoba. Pastor Steve teaches Bible studies at the Rescue Mission, and also teaches a class at Casper College.

The congregational demographics are skewed toward older members, with a good number of retired professionals among the regulars. The church appreciates good music and is one of only two in Wyoming with regular choir musical numbers.




Wisdom Collected From Our Retired Clergy For Future Generations of Leaders....

A Regional Star on the Rise

"And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some evangelist; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ:" Eph. 4:11-12 (KJV)

There are numerous things that I enjoy about being a part of the Regional staff. One in particular is the privilege of serving on the Ministerial Leadership Committee (MLC). Being on the MLC provides me an opportunity to seek communion with the Holy Spirit as I listen to those who come before the committee in an effort to make clear how God is speaking into their lives as they seek to go forward in the work and ministry of Jesus Christ. It never ceases to amaze me the places and situations from which God calls those whom God choose to serve in the ministry of Jesus Christ. I want to highlight one such journey in this article.



I would like for you to meet Rev. Brian Keithline, an Associate Pastor at the Aurora Hills Church in Aurora, CO. At first glance, upon meeting Brian one might assume that he is a quiet and unassuming individual. Nothing could be further from the truth!! As one comes to know Brian, you quickly

learn that he is a "committed servant" of the Lord with a heart for advancing the cause and kingdom of Jesus Christ. You will also come to know that God has blessed him with "a wealth" of talents, gifts and skills that he yearns to use in kingdom service. During one of our times together, while discussing his gifts and skills, I jokingly referred to him as "Superman in Clark Kent's clothing". (I will say more about this later.) Though this imagery is figurative in nature, there is yet some truth in this analysis. When one takes a close look at Brian's life's journey and listens to his life story it does not take long to recognize that God has prepared and called him to do great things in the ministry of Jesus Christ.

Brian was a young man in his twenties when he came to know Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior. Getting saved nor being saved was not a major concern to him at that time in his life. He had recently graduated from Metropolitan State College in Denver with a degree in journalism. Upper most on his mind was finding employment. His search for employment led him to a small local newspaper in Centerville, TN. Centerville is a small city in the state of Tennessee. One of Brian's first assignments was to cover the events taking place at the local flea market. The flea market was a big event in this small town. While carrying out this major assignment, he met a very vibrant and enthusiastic individual. Brian would soon learn that he was having "a chance encounter" with Pastor John Pennington. Pastor Pennington was the pastor of Centerville United Church. This "happenstance meeting" at the flea market would become a major turning point in Brian's life. After meeting Pastor Pennington, Brian started attending his church. He came to know Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior and he committed his life to serving the Lord. Brian had entered into a relationship with Pastor Pennington and Jesus Christ that would be directional for the next four years of his life. After two years at Centerville United Church, Pastor Pennington asked Brian to consider using his gifts and skills in "kingdom service". He invited Brian to teach and preach in his home church. The word about this young disciple of Christ spread quickly through Centerville and the surrounding area. Before Brian knew it, he was frequently being asked to preach, teach and to use his various gifts and skills throughout the Centerville area. (Wow!!! What a mighty God we serve.)

As Brian surrendered his heart to the Lord, he sensed that he was being called into the work of the ministry of Jesus Christ. And even more, his "heart was on fire" to serve the Lord!! As the passion to serve Christ grew brighter in Brian's heart, he recognized the need to prepare himself for the work that Christ was calling him to do. He began his theological education by taking some classes at Duke Divinity School in Durham, NC. He later returned to Denver and continued his theological education at Denver

ver Seminary, where he earned his Master of Divinity Degree. Rev. Brian Keithline is a servant of Jesus Christ with enormous spiritual gifts and talents that he yearns to use in the advancement of the cause and kingdom of Jesus Christ. Let me highlight some of Brian's gifts and skills for your review. He:

- 1) Knows and loves the Lord Jesus Christ, and has a heart for the work of the ministry;
- 2) Is a gifted teacher and preacher of the Word of God;
- Has excellent gifts and skills in the area of curriculum for the various ministries in the church and beyond the walls, particularly with children and youth;
- Has unique gifts and skills to make the gospel come alive through the art of writing and storytelling;
- 5) Has a heart for evangelism: locally, nationally and internationally. He believes that the Kingdom of God is open and available to all who will come!!! And,

One Pastors Thoughts on Missions

Are you a missionary? Is God calling you? Uhmm... if you are a follower of Jesus then your answer to both questions is YES! Or, at least, it should be. "As the Father has sent me, I am sending you," (John 20:21). Jesus was a "sent one" and if we are followers of Jesus, we are "sent ones", too.

At Ecumenical Church of Pueblo West (ECOPW) we have been trying to learn what that means in today's culture, in our community. This has resulted in mission trips to as far away as Bulgaria and Nicaragua. It has also meant mission trips outside our front door as over 50 volunteers serve in our twice weekly food pantry and monthly Free Farmers Market.

One development in ECOPW's learning to be sent has been our annual mission trips to various parts of our own country and ABCRM Region. Most recently, this has been going to work with our ABCRM mission on the Wind River Indian Reservation with Pastor Scott and Pam Engelhart. Scott and Pam faithfully serve two American Baptist Churches: First Baptist Church in Lander, WY and Wind River Indian Baptist Church in Fort Washakie, WY.

With support from ABCRM mission funds (all participants paid their own expenses) and the use of the ABCRM disaster relief trailer, we have been able to serve and work with our brothers and sisters in furthering the Gospel of Jesus Christ.



Along with volunteers from two other ABCRM churches and one Presbyterian Church, we have been able to partner with the Baptist in Lander and Fort Washakie to clean, paint, weed, mow, replace flooring, and hold VBS. This has been done with a total of over 30 volunteers over a three-year time frame. Your

mission dollars helped make this a reality!

As we have journeyed together on these mission trips, we have grown in our faith and understanding of who Jesus has called us to be. One of our core values in these mission trips is to be multigenerational. The youngest on these trips has been 18 months old, while the most chronologically gifted have been in their 80's! Men, and women, of all ages and all skill levels have been welcomed and fully participating.

If you are interested in having a church of missionaries, contact your Region Mission Coach and ask how to do it... (you're welcome Mike!) or, if you would be interested in partnering with ECOPW and other churches let us know. We learned to be missionaries by partnering with others who were learning. Together we are growing and learning what it means to be "ones sent".
