

Our Purpose—DRAFT


Throughout this year, the Region staff, in conjunction with the ABCRM Board, has examined the current ABCRM Purpose Statement as part of a healthy review to ensure that the Region exists to serve and to support its area churches and ministers in such a manner that recognizes both the autonomy of each church and also the culture of its community. The below Purpose Statement (still in a **DRAFT** form) aims to streamline the current document to ensure ABCRM remains committed to its core focus areas.

ABCRM exists to encourage and support the local church as it seeks to **Be**Christ in their community and the world.

FOCUS Areas

FOCUS ONE: Identify, Develop, and Support Pastors—ABCRM is committed to supporting pastors through coaching, training and providing resources, and to identifying and equipping future pastors. Pastoral leaders are a key component to the health and welfare of a local church.

FOCUS TWO: Assist Churches to Train, Disciple and Develop Congregational Leaders—ABCRM is committed to be-







ing a resource to pastors and congregations in obtaining and providing quality education for their Christian leaders. A call to lead is accompanied by the need to learn more about leading and leadership in various contexts.

FOCUS THREE: Help Churches and Leaders Engage in Mission—ABCRM is committed tot he historic purpose of sharing the Gospel into all the world. Mission always begins at the church door and extends to the ends of the earth. We obtain a larger picture of God's love and God's purpose for our lives by experiencing this "mission" personally, whether it be through visits of missionaries and leaders from various mission fields, by serving in mission locally, or by participating as a short-term volunteer missionary.



Sermon Title: "Is There a Price?" Sermon Text: Philippians 3:12-17

A Little Bit More About Us:

For her 60th birthday, God's theme for Ketly was: The best is about to come! Encouraging, right? After one year came COVID. During the 3-month lockdown while spending more time with God, He was preparing her. While she suspected something was wrong in September, it wasn't until December that she received her diagnosis: breast cancer. For someone in perfect health, this was a shock. The same week of this news, the theme of the last church service was: The best is about to come! Coincidence or providence? Ketly accepted the diagnosis with immense peace because she knew God had plans for her and this wasn't a death sentence. After all, the best was yet to come!

Ketly's battle with cancer fortified her commitment to a holistic approach in ministry. God had renewed her soul – her thoughts, emotions, and will – and she learned that if the soul and spirit aren't in tune with God's will, the physical body cannot heal. The Lord is leading her to a new ministry focus — a holistic approach — coming alongside people that are brokenhearted with cancer and other sicknesses and helping them achieve total renewal of body, mind, spirit, and soul. She also took massage classes and hopes to use prayer, massage, and anointing with oil to heal others. In addition, she was just ordained in September 11, 2022 at Peoples Baptist Church of Boston.



Rules of Procedure

Delegates to the Annual Session

- Each member congregation is entitled to two (2) delegates to the Region meeting for the first 150 resident members (or fewer), plus one (1) delegate for each 150 resident members. More than 75 additional resident members will entitle the congregation to an additional delegate. These delegates shall be certified by the congregation as its official representatives.
 - a. Each delegate shall have one (1) vote.
 - b. An alternate delegate may be elected for each delegate.
 - c. Voting members of the Region Board shall be voting delegates.
 - d. Others who are not delegates are encouraged to attend and may participate in discussion of motions, but have no vote.



BOARD ACTIONS ANNUAL GATHERING 2022

Actions of the Board

July of 2021 to August of 2022

ABCRM Board Meeting

July 30-31, 2021

Executive Minister Steve Van Ostran shared his continued efforts for the Board and Region Staff to focus on opportunities for churches to work together in common areas of ministry and mission. ABCRM exists to serve pastors and churches and financial constraints should never be an obstacle to ministry or mission.

Board President Eugene Downing reported the Executive Committee's recommendation that \$70,000 be added to the budget to facilitate church outreach. Such methods might include a growing partnership with Denver Seminary to connect interns with churches or to help fund Unstuck Group consultations and resources for interested churches.

Earlier in the summer, Highland Park Church in Colorado Springs deeded the property to the Region and two separate parties are interested in renting the facility.

Region Administrator Karen Van presented the revised 2022 Projected Budget with the newly allocated \$70,000 in church growth/pastoral leadership funds. Board Vice President Lacy McCuistion made the motion, which was seconded by Cathy Bayert. The motion passed unanimously.

Van Ostran also asked the Board to allocate \$20,000 from the Pueblo Mission Fund to assist IM Global Servant J.D. Reed in his "Adopt a Student" effort to help Hispanic pastors obtain seminary education in Latin America. Board Past President Matt Manning made the motion to dedicate \$10,000 in 2021 and another \$10,000 in 2022 to this project. McCuistion seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

ABCRM Board Meeting

February 18, 2022

The Executive Committee met on Feb. 17, 2022, for a one-day working retreat with Lance Witt, a consultant with the Unstuck Group. The retreat's intent was to evaluate how the Board might re-envision or establish more effective, more efficient, and more equitable structures and workflows to better represent the region's diversity.

As a result, the Board asked Staff Member Mike Oldham and Board Treasurer Loretta Dudley to review the Bylaws and to identify any possible areas of revision.

Executive Minister Steve Van Ostran shared his continued efforts to build closer relationships between regional churches, the Staff, and the Board. Part of that initiative is the current evaluation and revision of the Purpose Statement to act as a type of "score card" or matrix by which the Region can gauge its effectiveness in four key focal areas.

Mike Oldham stated that he had received a Palmer Grant of \$25,000 to be dedicated towards Pastoral Resiliency, an area of focus given the aftermath and continuing effects of the pandemic. Region Staff had thus worked together to use some of those funds to purchase accommodations and some meal options at Great Wolf Lodge in Colorado Springs for pastors, their families, and their children/grand-children on Mar. 3-5.

BOARD ACTIONS

ANNUAL GATHERING 2022

Actions of the Board

Region Administrator Karen Van shared how the Region had distributed \$108,000 in Technology Grants from December of 2021 through February of 2022. The grants, available for up to \$5,000, were earmarked to help purchase equipment, Web services, and to help secure other technology needs for churches. About \$223,122 remained in the Earned Interest on Investments fund balance to possibly fund other identified areas for grants.

Minister to Future Leaders Rev. Lauren Parliament had held a youth leadership training/retreat in January. Also, Van Ostran shared how the Region Staff had teamed up with Restoration Outreach Programs (ROP) in Aurora as one of the ways in which the Region and its churches can connect with urban ministry/outreach efforts.

Property Updates: The Greeley church property underwent \$40,000 worth of bat abatement procedures in the fall and winter. The facility still needs about \$500,000 of further maintenance projects (Oldham). Also, the Board approved a resolution to undertake a three-month discovery period and evaluation of the Circle Drive Property in Colorado Springs to determine the best Christian stewardship steps going forward, which might include the sale of the property. Board Member Steve Scroggins made the motion, seconded by Dave DeMott, and the resolution passed unanimously (with Drew Tarwater recused).

ABCRM Board Meeting

August 11-12, 2022

Executive Minister Steve Van Ostran provided further work on the effort to re-imagine the Purpose Statement with the streamlined vision statement of: ABCRM exists to help local churches BE CHRIST in their world. The four focus areas thus include: (1) Identify, Develop, and Support Pastors, (2) Assist Churches in Training, Discipling, and Developing Congregational Leaders, (3) Help Churches and Leaders to Engage in Mission, and (4) Support Churches in Various Stages of the Life Cycle.

The Mar. 3-5 Pastor's Getaway at Great Wolf Lodge was a success for the nearly 25 pastors/family members that attended, and additional projects (similar in nature) are being planned for later dates.

Van Ostran discussed the Region's interest in identifying a person for a Bi-Vocational and Rural Pastor Ministry Coach to cover most of the area previously served by Mike Oldham, now serving as the Region Administrator. The goal has been to realign staff personnel less by geographic locations and more towards common demographics, culture, etc., (such as rural churches, urban and ethnic churches).

The Executive Committee approved eleven Pueblo Grants for the July 31 award cycle. Nine of those grants were fully funded and two were partially funded.

Board Member Darren Stroh made a motion to approve the budget, seconded by Estelle Torpy, and the budget was approved unanimously.

The Region Staff continues to make strides in its efforts to visit as many churches as possible throughout the Region to share in worship with our regional family members.

Discussion was shared about the Gathering 2022 in which the theme is centered about rest and relaxation, and in helping pastors to "Know Themselves to Lead Others" to achieve the greatest amount of success both individually and corporately as Christians in mission together.

EXECUTIVE MINISTER'S ReportRev. Dr. Steve Van Ostran

It is an honor and a privilege to serve the people, the communities, and the churches that are the American Baptist Churches of the Rocky Mountains. I am serving in my 15th year as your Executive Minister. When I share that title with folks, most outside our ABC family ask for a further explanation. I understand why. The title was a late 20th-century attempt to explain the unique combination of administrative and executive responsibilities this role has along with its pastoral and ministerial responsibilities. This role is not unique in such a manner. Even when I was a local church pastor, my daughter used to tell her friends that I was the "Boss" of the church. You all know the reality of a pastor's position ... not "Boss" but "Servant with a little bit of clout, MAYBE"!

At any rate, I wear multiple hats and I am blessed with a wonderfully competent staff, and an equally wonderful Board, to help me navigate the wearing of those hats. All this in order fulfill the mission to which you have charged me and to which I feel called. For the last several years, we described that mission to be "Empowering Churches, Equipping Leaders and Effecting Mission". But during this last year, the Board has challenged itself (and our team) to engage some of the same exercises and processes in the "Unstuck Process" that we asked of the churches last year in our Gathering. Consequently, as we have continued to wrestle with how to describe what we are really called to do, we have arrived at a new way to state our purpose and mission as an organization:

Helping Churches to Be Christ in Their World!

I believe this statement, in addition to identifying our primary mission and purpose, also speaks to our core values and key boundaries. First, Christ and His Church are whom we exist to serve. We don't want to be an organization that exists to replace the church or one that exists simply to fund Christ-like ministries even though that is a noble idea. We exist to serve the local church. And while the "church" will continue to "evolve" (that may make some of you cringe!), to transform and to change in order to best serve the evolving and changing world and culture in which it exists, our purpose is to serve local church no matter what it looks like in the coming age. Although we are tasked specifically to serve the "Baptist" churches that have chosen to be a part of ABCRM, our mission extends beyond this small tribe to the greater Kingdom.

Second, we believe that the purpose of the church is to be **Christ's body in the world**. This is both a metaphor for the universal church, but also for the local church. And while we know that the church cannot provide the salvific sacrifice of Jesus, the true Christ, we can serve as Christ's ambassadors contemporaneously and be His Body to minister to the world today. Our churches must point individuals toward a fuller knowledge and relationship with the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

And this statement also reminds us that our ministry begins in our local community, but it also extends beyond ourselves and our immediate interests to the communities adjacent to us as we are to those communities around the world. We are called to be a "missionary" organization that works cross-culturally both in our geographic region and into the larger world. The church's "world" can no longer be defined by the boundaries of a neighborhood, city or county but it also extends even to the "ends of the earth."

In addition to wrestling with a clearer understanding of our mission and purpose, we have also wrestled with how best to accomplish this purpose. Such questions include: What strategies or foci should our ministry serve? How do we staff the Region in order to fulfill this strategy? What must we do to begin to implement these strategies?

Strategically the ABCRM Board and Staff have identified four core focus areas for our ministry efforts:

ANNUAL GATHERING 2022

- Identify, Develop, and Support Pastors
- Assist Churches to Train, Disciple, and to Develop Congregational Leaders
- Help Churches and Leaders to Engage in Mission
- Support Churches in Doing Ministry in their Unique Context

It is our hope that with this clarity, we will better be able not only to decide what to do in ministry but also what "not" to do. As we work in these four areas, we will gain a sharper focus on God's purpose for our ministry and mission together.

As we work on refocusing our mission and vision, we have also been confronted with the question of how best to staff for this newly sharpened focus. One key driver of this was the retirement of Karen Van as our Region Administrator after 15 years of service. We made the decision early last year that the best replacement for her was already serving on our staff, Mike Oldham. Mike's knowledge of the Region and his skills in administration and organization made it clear that with some training he would be the ideal person to serve alongside me in leadership of our Regional Staff. To that end we developed a transition plan that included Mike working on a Certificate in Non-profit Finance and Management at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs as well as a gradual transition to the role of Region Administrator. Mike began stepping into this role after the first of the year and began fully filling the role with the completion of the annual audit at the end of April.

As we began to think about Mike's transition, our current staff, and the nature, location, and interests of our churches, we began to see that the current geographic "clustering" of our churches might not be the best way to assign staff to serving the churches in their various needs and challenges. It became clear, for example, that our churches in Colorado Springs had more challenges similar to the churches in Denver than to our rural and small-town churches along US 50 in Southern Colorado. To that end, we have decided that going forward, our staff will serve in the following capacities:

Rev. Lauren Parliament – Minister to Future Leaders and Discipleship

Developing programs for youth and youth leaders, create a conduit for recruiting new leaders to serve ABC congregations, serve as Front Range Camping Director and liaison to camping programs at WYOBA and Grand Mesa.

Rev. Rodney Perry – Ministry and Mission Coach for Metropolitan and Ethnic Churches

Serves as coach to congregations along the 1-25 corridor from Laramie to Pueblo West, staffs the Race Relations Task Force, and serves as liaison to the ministerial Leadership Committee.

To Be Announced – Ministry and Mission Coach for Rural and Bi-vocational Churches

Serve as coach to congregations in Wyoming, the Eastern Plains, and to Southern Colorado and other assigned congregations as appropriate, develop programming and assistance for bi-vocational Pastors.

Rev. James Conley – Ministry and Mission Facilitator for Western Slope (Part-time)

Serve as primary point of contact for the churches located on Western Slope, assists in connecting other staff to help meet needs of those churches.

Rev. Dr. Kim Skattum – Pastor to Pastors (Part-time)

Will provide pastoral care to ABCRM pastors as appropriate, give guidance to other staff on how best to meet needs of this important constituency.

As we looked at this alignment (and in knowing both Mike's and my needs to continue to be in churches), it also became clear that we would need part-time assistance in the office. God blessed us with a connection through one of our member churches, Forefront at Harvey Park, that led us to hire Samantha Rhodes to help us deal with the challenges of database management, program planning, and support and basic file management and maintenance. We are also blessed with the part-time service and expertise of Rev. Brian Keithline, pastor at FBC of Loveland, to help us maintain our communications.

So that's the "who" going forward, but what will the programming and service look like going forward?

Well, our hope is that it will be more of the best ministries that took place this last year.

One of the best the best things that happened this last year was that our staff and a small cohort of pastors engaged in the "Sherpa Training" from GiANT Leadership. If you are reading this report, it's because you picked it up at our Gathering, and I hope you are already experiencing some of the same insights and benefits that we gained from this training. Those who went through this training have learned some ideas, tools, and skills to make them more effective in leading others and to be more understanding not only of themselves but of the people that they lead. The introduction of this resource and the roll-out of cohort groups in the coming year is one way in which we are seeking to engage fully Focus Area One of our purpose and mission statement.

Likewise, ABCRM was awarded a grant from the Palmer Trust administered by the American Baptist Foundation to help our pastors develop resilience in their ministry. Mike applied for this grant and leads the team that is developing these programs. The first program was held in March for pastors and families at the Great Wolfe Lodge. We had about 20 pastors and their families join us for this time of rest, relaxation, challenge and education. It was a joy to see the children and grandchildren of pastors bond in this time together and to watch friendships blossom and/or be renewed. We are in the early stages of planning the next event as I write this report, and I trust that we will be inviting pastors to the next event at the Gathering.

You may wonder why resilience events are important.

During the last year we have seen an increased number of our pastors retire, quit, or face unique challenges in their ministry. We have had one pastor pass away unexpectedly and several who are facing cancer or other life-threatening illnesses. We have worked with pastors who are dealing with marital crisis and others simply dealing with the on-going stress we find in our new normal, even as they are called to help their parishioners deal with the same issues. As of this writing, ABCRM has eight congregations with pastoral openings and at various stages in the search/discernment process. Put another way, over 10 percent of our churches are in some stage of pastoral transition. Most of these are not directly attributable to pastoral stress, but most have some element involved. But this is only one of four focus areas in which we are working.

We also had a few churches engage the Unstuck Group training during the last year and some have seen excellent results. While Unstuck is not for every church, we have consistently (throughout the years) tried to help churches engage their communities in the way that best fits them. The Pueblo Community Service Grants have become an important part of our ministry. At our last Board meeting in August, seven community service grants were awarded totaling \$22,425 for projects in seven different church communities. We see that one of the ways we can continue to support churches in reaching out to their community is to provide seed money for new projects, and it is my hope in time, that we can also provide church to church support for some of these projects through Backyard Mission Projects and other programs like this.

Our work as a region continues to prosper despite the real challenges our churches are facing. We are committed to walking beside the local church in this time and we're excited to see how God is going to

use our churches to bring healing and hope.




GRAND MESA BAPTIST CAMP ReportSteven Scroggins, Camp Chairperson

HIGHLIGHTS

I will lift up mine eyes unto the hill, from whence cometh my help. Psalm 121:1

Let's talk about our Baptist camp programs! This summer, we had 164 campers, not counting numerous necessary staff members. We had 34 elementary, 35 middle school, and 22 high school campers. We also had a great family camp with 73 attendees.

The theme for elementary camp was "Facing your

Fears" using Psalm 56:3 — "When I am afraid, O Lord Almighty, I put my trust in You." Campfire stories and chapel messages included Bible characters such as Joseph, Moses, Daniel, David, Esther, and Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. The campers rotated through "Fear Factor" stations such as blind food tasting, a blind sensory game, heights, and trust walks. They finished the last night of camp with a long-time favorite — flour war.

The High School camp theme was "Stronger Together" based on Ecclesiastes 4:12 — "Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken." AMERICAN BAPTIST WOMEN'S MINISTRIES Wyoming Report Barbra Vanzant

American Baptist Women of Wyoming do not have an elected president, but Barbra Vanzant was willing to volunteer her contact information to the region for a connection point. Barbra reports the WABW is a very loose-knit group of women between a few churches that do not have structured meetings.

Many of our ladies still contribute to specific ABW offerings, such as refit, national support, or various White Cross requests.

Our primary gathering is in August at our Women's Retreat at Camp Wyoba. Jenita Calton has been our conference leader and principal planner of this enjoyable and thoughtful weekend event. Besides Bible study and enjoying the camping

experience, we usually have a brief gathering as ABW members to conduct whatever business needs our attention. This often involves expenditures regarding our Mabel Bolle scholarship, Wyoba scholarships, or items needed at Camp Wyoba. Our most recent contributions have been used to replace most of the mattresses at Camp Wyoba.

Until it was canceled, we met about once a year to roll bandages for the Congo. This was a favored activity, and we miss the opportunity to do something concrete to aid our missionaries. This has been replaced with gift cards and other monetary offerings for their assistance.



MINISTERIAL LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE (MLC) Report Dave DeMott, Chairperson

The Committee, in conjunction with region staff, is re-evaluating its membership and regional representation. We hope to have a full slate of members representing the region's dynamics by year's end.

The MLC met in late July to consider two candidates for ordination. This was the first meeting for both. During this first meeting, candidates are asked to prepare and present a spiritual autobiography of their call to ministry. The Committee reviews this paper and determines whether to encourage candidates to continue the ordination process. Region staff can also clarify the logistics of the ordination process to candidates.

A second meeting will be held later in 2022 to discuss each candidate's theological perspective.

The Committee is also re-assessing the educational component of the ordination process. We are attempting to structure a more contemporary model with less expensive options for those needing training.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

FINANCIAL Statements

ABCRM has benefited from eleven years of consistent growth of the endowment. The endowment provides 83% of our annual budget and allows ABCRM to support our churches through a strong staff and programming. The principles and policies that have guided this endowment were set in place by a wise Investment Committee and Region Board. For the past 13 years, Rev. Dr. Steve Van Ostran and Karen VanValkenburgh provided steady and wise guidance as staff.

Unfortunately, 2022 has been a more challenging time for ABCRM finances. The endowment has dropped 14.5% from January 1, 2022.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

ANNUAL GATHERING 2022



The principles and policies established years ago will continue to provide a solid economic foundation upon which ABCRM can continue to work.

AUDIT

Taylor Roth CPAs once again audited the ABCRM finances. Once again, under the leadership of Karen Van, Taylor Roth gave us a clean audit. (See the 2021 Audit Report and letter to the Board.) The 2023 Proposed Budget includes the 2021 audited finances.

ENDOWMENT

The ABCRM Endowment provides funds for the work of ABCRM based on 5% of the past 12 quarters. (See the Budget Allocation Table.) Because of the strength of the past 12 quarters, the recommended draw from the endowment increased over the 2022 budget allocation.

BUDGET YEAR-TO-DATE

The attached 2023 Proposed Budget includes a year-to-date spending report for 2022. Non-endowment income continues to decline. Front Range Camping did not show the normal income because of the way in which Quaker Ridge Camp collected fees. The other major note is that ABCRM does not budget for grants (because they come from non-budget funds). At the end of the year, 41702 Grant Income will balance the amount in 8855 Grants.

GRANTS GIVEN

ABCRM provided almost \$108,000 in grants to churches and pastors through the first seven months of 2022. These grants helped churches upgrade their technology, provide food for those who are struggling to make ends meet, and new tools for pastors to use in their ministry.

NEW STAFF MEMBERS

ABCRM hired Samantha Rhodes as the part-time Administrative Assistant. Since starting in May,

she has become an invaluable part of the ABCRM team. Many of you have already experienced her helpfulness and warmth. Samantha is a member at Forefront Church at Harvey Park and the mother of two beautiful little girls.

Rev. Dr. Steve Van Ostran has stated that a Rural and Bivocational Ministry and Mission Coach will be added in 2023. This position will cover much of the territory that I served along with other responsibilities.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION

The Statement of Financial Position compares where ABCRM is at the end of July with where we were at the end of July 2021. In this report, you will notice that our endowment funds have shown significant losses.

2023 PROPOSED BUDGET

The proposed budget seeks to reflect the values and mission of ABCRM. This includes new budget items (highlighted in yellow). The ABCRM Board and Rev. Dr. Steve Van Ostran have identified key priorities of supporting pastors and churches, engaging in mission both regionally and internationally, supporting pastors and churches as they seek to build better racial relations, and invest in future leaders. The budget also includes funds for the new staff position. (See the attached 2023 Proposed Budget.)

We have audited the financial statements of American Baptist Churches of the Rocky Mountains for the year ended December 31, 2021, and have issued our report thereon dated June 1, 2022. The significant accounting policies used by American Baptist Churches of the Rocky Mountains are described in Note 2 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during 2021. We noted no transactions entered into by the Organization during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. The attached Adjusting Journal Entries include reclassifications necessary for financial presentation only. No misstatements were detected as a result of audit procedures. These reclassifying journal entries are reflected in your audited financial statements.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated June 1, 2022.

Independent Auditors' Report

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **American Baptist Churches of the Rocky Mountains**, (a Colorado nonprofit corporation), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2021, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

The Schedule of Cash Activity – United Missions Agency Account and the Schedule of United Missions Agency Account Distributions on page 13 and 14 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

American Baptist Churches of the Rocky Mountains (Organization) is a nonprofit corporation, incorporated under the laws of the State of Colorado. The Organization operates as the regional office for congregations of American Baptist Churches of Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico and a portion of Utah. The Organization provides pastoral assistance and guidance to member congregations, assistance with development of church sites, support of various mission programs and ecumenical objectives, and educational activities. The Organization primarily is supported by investment income, contributions, and Camp Wyoba fees and donations.

The financial results for 2020 were affected by a global pandemic that closed down many activities starting in March of 2020. For ABCRM, the effects of COVID 19 resulted not holding any summer camps, travel expense greatly reduced, and a higher amount of grants to help the churches and pastors.

COVID was still an issue during 2021, but was lessened due to the availability of a vaccine. During 2021, ABCRM held summer camp with lower participation, mission trips were postponed and travel was less than normal years. The Region did try to find ways to support the churches and pastors during this unsettling time with Zoom communication and special grants.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

1. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

2. Basis of Presentation

The Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

Net assets without donor restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objectives of the Organization. These net assets may be used at the discretion of the Organization's management and board of directors.

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets that are subject to stipulations imposed by donors and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the Organization or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, whereby the donor has stipulated that the funds be maintained in perpetuity.

Donor restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets are reclassified from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions in the statement of activities.

ANNUAL GATHERING 2022

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES (Continued)

Contributions of property and equipment or cash restricted to acquisition of property and equipment are reported as net assets with donor restrictions if the donor has restricted the use of

the property or equipment to a particular program. These restrictions expire when the assets are placed in service.

3. Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all unrestricted liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents, except those amounts held in investment accounts for long term purposes.

4. Capitalization and Depreciation

The Organization follows the practice of capitalizing all expenditures which extend the life of property and equipment in excess of \$2,500. The fair value of donated assets is similarly capitalized. Depreciation of property and equipment is provided over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis.

5. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

6. Income Taxes

The Organization has received an Internal Revenue Service exemption from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3). Accordingly, no provision or liability for income taxes has been provided in the accompanying financial statements.

7. Functional Reporting of Expenses

For the year ended December 31, 2021, costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities and the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated amongst the programs and supporting services benefited. The allocations are determined by management on a rational and systematic basis. Some areas are allocated based on a clear relationship between the expenses and the related function; i.e. Camp Wyoba expenses are allocated to Youth and mission trips expenses and contributions are allocated to Mission. Salaries, employee benefits, insurance, telephone, travel expense and other areas are allocated on a time and effort basis.

8. Summarized Prior-Year Information

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Organization's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2020, from which the summarized information was derived.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES (Continued)

9. Fair Value Measurements

The Organization is subject to the provisions of the *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures* accounting standard. This standard requires use of a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three levels: quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities (Level 1); inputs other than quoted market prices that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly (Level 2); and unobservable inputs for the asset or liability (Level 3).

10. Revenue Recognition

The Organization recognizes contributions when cash, securities or other assets; an unconditional promise to give; or a notification of a beneficial interest is received; conditional promises to give with a measurable performance barrier and a right of return are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been met.

11. Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through June 1, 2022, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 - INVESTMENTS (Concluded)

As part of the Black Forest Camp sale in 2005, the organization designated \$2,000,000 for the Carl Bennett Youth fund and \$11,000,000 for the Ministry/Mission fund. 5% of the average asset market value of the last three years may be used to support ABCRM programs. This amount (5%) is shown as "Investment earnings available for operations" in the revenue section of the Statement of Activities. For 2021, this was \$850,000.

The Organization experiences fluctuations in the market value of its investment funds from the sale of Black Forest Camp. Some years the value of these investments is greater than the 5% that the organization is allowed to use in that year. This growth in the investment over that allowed 5% is shown on the Statement of Activities in the lower section labeled "Investment income, net of allocations to operations." In 2020, \$2,290,910 was recorded to investment income, net of allocation to operations and in 2021, \$2,976,385 was recorded to reflect the increase in the investments.

In 2007, the board designated funds from the sale of closed church properties to be used for the development of new churches, church transformation and carrying costs for closed properties. For the years ending 2021 and 2020, the balance in the church development fund was \$436,453 and \$467,463. respectively.

Hillcrest Baptist Church of Arvada, Colorado is located on property owned by the Colorado Baptist Convention. This property was purchased in 1965 for \$30,000, but was not included on the financial statements until 2008. The current financial statements include the property.

The Organization is a 1/3 owner in Kentucky Circle Village, a retirement community in Glendale, Colorado. Management has not been able to establish a value and no amount has been included in these financial statements.

Sale of Donated Property

On April 8, 2016, the First Baptist Church of Pueblo quitclaimed their property to the Organization. The donated property, located in Pueblo, Colorado, consisted of buildings on four parcels of land.

On November 16, 2016, the Organization sold the property to Pueblo County for \$1,900,000. After cost of sales for real estate commission, previously paid rental income, and closing costs of \$249,501, net proceeds to the Organization were \$1,650,499.

In addition to the quitclaim agreement, the Organization was asked to make \$600,000 in grants to three Pueblo charities. The Salvation Army of Pueblo, Pueblo Rescue Mission, and Pueblo Cooperative Care Center each received \$200,000. The ABCRM Executive Committee voted to donate an additional \$126,550 to other American Baptist and related organizations.

On January 23, 2009, First Baptist Church of Monte Vista closed and quitclaimed their church to the Organization. December 14, 2018, the Organization moved to quitclaim the property to another Colorado nonprofit organization resulting in a \$203,772 loss on disposition after removing the asset from the financial statements.

On June 25, 2019, First Baptist Church of Center, Colorado closed and quitclaimed their church to ABCRM. The Organization held the property until January 13, 2020 when the property was quitclaimed to another Colorado nonprofit organization.

On October 2021, Highland Park Baptist Church, Colorado closed and quitclaimed their church to ABCRM. The Organization is currently looking for an assessment of the property. The Board is considering selling the property and using the proceeds to help other churches.

NOTE 6 - CHURCH PROPERTY EXPENSES

The Organization incurred carrying costs from Aurora Community Baptist Church, First Baptist Church of Greeley and other owned property which are not primary to the operation of the Region.

NOTE 7 - RETIREMENT PLAN

The Organization's full time employees participate in a defined contribution retirement plan sponsored by The Ministers and Missionaries Benefit Board of American Baptist Churches. All non-seasonal employees scheduled to work thirty or more hours per week by the Organization are eligible for participation. Total benefit plan contributions for the year were \$84,220.

NOTE 8 - AVAILABILITY AND LIQUIDITY

The Organization may use five percent of the average asset market value of the Black Forest Endowment (Board designated youth fund and mission/ministry fund) of the twelve preceding calendar quarters to support missions, programs and any designated purpose. For 2022, ABCRM has budgeted \$970,000 to support the ministries' financial needs. In addition, the ABCRM Board has designated \$393,419 of Unused Interest Allocation to be used to cover ongoing operating expenses in event of a cash crunch.

NOTE 9 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization has significant investments, which are subject to fluctuations in market value from year to year.



Rev. Paul Robert Edie (1931-2021)


